- 4. Formally apply directly to the agency, which may include a specific application, resume, cover letter, and background materials;
- 5. Correspond with agency prior to internship;
- 6. Obtain acceptance from agency prior to internship;
- 7. Complete internship contract with Internship Coordinator prior to internship.

Registration

A student may register for a maximum of three internship credits. Internship credits are applied as elective credits, and additional internship credits will not count toward students' graduation requirements.

Official course registration requires coordination between the applicant, Internship Coordinator and Assistant Dean of Social and Behavioral Sciences (SOBL). Students may register for the internship course only after they have secured the internship and the Internship Coordinator/ supervising faculty member has issued permission to register. The contract must be signed by the student and the Internship Supervisor. The Internship Coo
