**GALLOWAY TWP., NJ** – On Monday, September 17, from 4:00 to 5:30 P.M. in the Alton Auditorium, the Richard Stockton College of New Jersey will host Temple University School of Law Professor Burton Caine. Dr. Caine will deliver the Constitution Day Keynote Presentation with a focus on religion and the Constitution entitled “The Supreme Court Prefers the First Commandment over the First Amendment and Shreds Our Liberties.”

Professor Caine chairs the Board of Directors of Americans for Religious Liberty and he has represented the organization in litigation seeking removal of the Ten Commandments from government buildings and grounds. Professor Caine received his J.D. from Harvard Law School and has also served on boards and committees of the American Civil Liberties Union and the Greater Philadelphia Lawyers Committee for Soviet Jewry.

Professor Caine’s scholarship in law and religion, as well as other constitutional law issues, is internationally renowned. He has addressed issues of constitutional law throughout Europe, the Middle East and Asia and has spoken on behalf of the United States Government regarding Constitutional Law and Civil Liberties and Antitrust issues in India, Nepal, New Zealand, The Philippines, Taiwan, Thailand, Lesotho, Zambia, Kenya, Liberia, France, Mauritius, Bangladesh, Japan, Korea, Germany, Norway, Columbia, Israel and the people’s Republic of China.

The impact of his legal expertise has included such notable accomplishments as lecturing to the Committee of the Philippines legislature drafting a constitution for that country and debating the death penalty on national TV in China.
